World watches, nation zigzags

rachkevych@kpmedia.ua Not since the 2004 Orange Revolution has the world looked

so intensely at Ukraine. Since the Georgia conflict erupted this month, Ukraine is once again saddled with its historical role as buffer between Russia and the West – and once more

sending out conflicting messages to both sides.

With a buildup of Western and Russian naval vessels in the Black Sea south of Ukraine, tensions escalated

further after Moscow snubbed the West on Aug. 27 and recognized the independence of Georgia's two breakaway enclaves, Abkhazia and South Ossetia. see CONFLICT, page 15

Yulia rises to top of power list

he top powerbroker in Ukraine is Prime Minister Yulia Tymoshenko, according to the annual ranking of the nation's 100 most influential individuals by Korrespondent, the Russian-language sister publication of the Kyiv Post.

"Now Ukraine's economy and politics largely depend on what side of the bed the prime minister gets up from," the popular newsmagazine wrote in its Aug. 22 edition. "The most active mechanisms of influence on the country are accumulated in her hands, not in the hands of a distrusted president."

Tymoshenko's resurgence came after a remarkable comeback last fall when she returned as prime minister following her party's strong showing in a snap parliament election. In regaining the premiership she held briefly in 2005, Tymoshenko thrust aside the government led by Victor Yanukovych, whose path to the presidency through a rigged election was blocked by the 2004 democratic Orange Revolution.

She is now well-positioned for the presidential election scheduled for 2010. Yanukovych fell from first place to xth in this year's ranking, behind Rinat







Akhmetov, Ukraine's richest tycoon and fellow Party of Regions member.

Oksana Baiul: Ukrainian star still shines, 14 years after triumph

Even 14 years later. Oksana Baiul's triumph stands out in Ukraine. She is not only the first Olympic gold medalist in independent Ukraine, but remains the nation's only Olympic gold medalist in female singles figure skating.

If there is justice in the world, the 1994 Olympics in Lillehammer, Norway,

provided some – as well as a dose of magic. Baiul, then a 16-year-old figure skater from Dnipropetrovsk with a heartbreaking life story, charmed hearts all over the world with her athletic grace on ice.

By the time she was 13, Baiul had lost her mother to cancer, her maternal grandparents and her first coach moved to Canada, while the Soviet Union her birthplace – dissolved.

Now 30, she continues to dazzle

the world, increasing the visibility of Ukraine along the way, but as a U.S. resident. She is living in New Jersey and training in New York for her role in the Broadway show "Cold as Ice," which is expected to open in 2010. She also hopes to skate soon for crowds in Ukraine and Russia. And she is writing an autobiography.

For Ukrainians with dimming recollections of a national hero, the Kyiv Post decided to catch up with Baiul and find out what she's up to, through her words and the words of those close to her.

"Many athletes simply win, but she will remain in the hearts of people forever," said Nikolai Morozov, Baiul's coach and choreographer. "She can do everything on ice. A huge responsibility lies with every Olympic champion, as many fans desire to see their idol performing after the competition is over. That's exactly what Oksana is doing now."

Anya Zadorozhnyuk, a Ukrainian figure skater who is part of a couple's team with Sergei Verbillo, is amazed that Baiul keeps such a demanding schedule, even though she long ago made it to the pinnacle of her sport. "She has two full practices per day and keeps herself in great shape,' Zadoroznyuk said.

But nobody tells the Oksana Baiul story like the champion herself:

Kyiv lands spot on Monopoly board thanks to strong Internet campaign

what may be one of Ukraine's few international successes recently, Kyiv has landed a spot on the game board of the international Monopoly edition. It even beat out Moscow to do so.

If only joining NATO, the European Union and avoiding a showdown with Russia over Crimea were so easy, many of Ukraine's problems would be solved.

The votes of Monopoly fans landed Ukraine's capital on a magenta space. There it will share a color grouping with Istanbul and Toronto on the Monopoly Here and Now: The World Edition game board.

This is the latest version of the popular board game in which the object is to crush your opponents financially, a skill honed in real life by many of Ukraine's oligarchs.

Dirk Lustig is general manager of Toy Toy Ukraine, which is the official distributor of Monopoly for the Hasbro company. Lustig is quick to talk up the worldly benefits to Kyiv's inclusion.

"All officials of Ukraine think about what they can do to promote the positive image of Ukraine in the world," Lustig said, "and now we have the most popular board game in the world played by 715 million kids, teenagers and adults - [all seeking to be] owner the world. It's a PR campaign free of charge for many years.'

The image chosen to represent Kviv is the tall statue of the woman on Kyiv's main square, Maidan Nezalezhnosti. She is the symbol of independence.

Monopoly fans got the ability to vote online and choose what cities should be included. There were some limits on voting, but not many, giving the advantage to organized campaigns.

Kyiv finished in 16th place in the voting. The top 20 cities among 68 in contention landed on the board, plus two "wild card" cities chosen by vote also. Voting started in late January and lasted for six weeks, with more than five million ballots cast.

Kyiv succeeded largely due to a campaign organized by people in Ukraine and Ukrainian Diaspora living abroad, including in the United States and Canada.


"We gathered a small group of active people who started a campaign on the Internet and later more people joined us, spreading information about the campaign among Ukrainians living in Ukraine and abroad," said Mykola Malukha, a Kyiv journalist who headed the campaign.

Monopoly is owned by Hasbro, a leading company in children's and family leisure time entertainment products and services including games and toys ranging from traditional to high-tech. Players compete to acquire wealth through economic activity involving the buying, renting and trading of properties using play money, as players take turns moving around the board according to the roll of the dice.

Since 1935, more than 250 million copies of the Monopoly game have been sold in 103 countries and 37 languages. More then 200 different editions of the game have been published since its creation

In this edition, the utility spaces have been updated to more renewable forms of solar and wind energy. Also, the new game version allows the purchase of not just real estate, but cities as well.

The new game version Here and Now edition is available for purchase now.





The scene was malicious at Blinoff cafe late on Aug. 23 in downtown Kyiv as two arsonists set the place ablaze, killing four and injuring seven, including themselves. It was far from a typical evening at the 24-hour cafe, located on Shevchenko Boulevard across from Shevchenko Park. Two men entered carrying 30-liter canisters of flammable liquid about 1 a.m. and set the cafe afire. The suspects are currently under police guard at a Kyiv hospital. Evewitness reports said the sprinkler system did not activate, an extinguisher wasn't available and no sign indicating a fire exit. A police spokesperson said several motives are being investigated, including "rival competition." A change in cafe management took place on Aug. 15, according to one news report. Blinoff is part of Ukraine's Mastergood restaurant group, which refused to speculate on arsonists' motivation. If convicted, the two arsonists face three to 15 years in prison. (Yaroslav Chernenko)


Accident claims lawmaker's life



Mykhailo Syrota, a longtime Ukrainian lawmaker regarded as the "father" of Ukraine's Constitution for his work in crafting and getting it adopted by parliament in 1996, died in a car accident on Aug. 25 outside of Kyiv. Details are sketchy, but reports by police indicate that while driving his Toyota Camry, Syrota crashed head-on with a Daewoo-Lanos. He and the driver of the Daewoo died. Syrota's wife, a passenger, was severely injured. A longtime lawmaker, Syrota in this parliament served as a high-ranking member of the faction of ex-speaker Volodymyr Lytvyn. At Syrota's Aug. 26 funeral, President Victor Yushchenko said the country had lost a dedicated man who took upon himself "great responsibility" for writing the country's constitution. (UNIAN)

Fragile independence

Looking back at the last 17 years, Ukraine has come a long way since declaring independence in 1991 from a collapsing and oppressive Soviet Union. Yet the country's persistently feuding leaders have failed to capitalize on key and achievable results that would have make Ukraine's independence less fragile today. Infighting has delayed progress. The leaders could have better spent this time ensuring growth, energy and defense security, less corruption, and the rebuilding of educational and medical systems on the verge of collapse.

Thanks largely to market-driven, supply-demand economic forces, Ukraine put years of economic stagnation behind, replacing it with more than seven years of steady growth. True, much of this new wealth is monopolized by corrupt businessmen and politicians and has yet to spread to a budding middle class. When it does, Ukraine's economic gains will strengthen the country more than any inspiring leader.

Ukraine's upside is huge. The country's potential was demonstrated this summer with a respectable showing in the Olympic Games, where the team placed 10th overall, besting prominent and powerful nations.

Kyiv has made major democratic leaps. It has also managed to avoid ethnic and military conflicts that have plagued most other ex-Soviet states.

But as recent events in Georgia show, threats remain higher than ever to statehood, the nation's borders and its success as a beacon of democracy in post-Soviet space. And the threats all stem from a preying northern neighbor, Russia.

Recent polls of Ukrainians conducted indicate that the majority of Ukrainians recognize these threats, starting with the simmering separatism in Crimea backed by Moscow. But they are heavily divided as to what solutions to support, be it early withdrawal of Russia's Black Sea Fleet stationed on the peninsula, a cool-headed wait-and-see approach, or speedy NATO membership.

Democracies thrive on pluralism, but the splits in Ukraine on such a strategic issue are the result of confusion and orchestrated disarray. Divided, Ukraine is easy prey for Russia and its traditional "divide and conquer tactics" so successfully implemented through separatists enclaves in Georgia.

It is no surprise Ukrainians are so divided. Ukraine's feuding leaders have failed to learn the lessons of history. Personal rivalries have defeated attempts to solidify Ukrainian independence. Take, for example, the history of the Cossack Hetmans, whose divisions left the country weak and vulnerable to predatory neighbors.

The Georgia conflict with Russia provided a time to unify. Instead, Ukraine's president, prime minister and leading oppositionists pointed fingers at each other seeking to polarize the populace. President Victor Yushchenko's administration went so far as to accuse Premier Yulia Tymoshenko of being soft on Georgia due to a putative secret pact with the Kremlin. The response from Tymoshenko's camp was denial, and a pledge to refrain from scoring points "on the blood of Georgian soldiers." The Moscow-friendly Victor Yanukovych, meanwhile, stood on the sidelines flaring up pro-Russian sentiment in eastern Ukraine and taking sides with the Kremlin against Georgia, Ukraine's pro-Western ally.

It is hard to decipher what is in Tymoshenko's mind, due to her superb acting. But her diehard presidential ambitions are clear, as are her attempts to clean up Ukraine's corrupt energy sector and free it of Russian tentacles.

We did expect more, however, from the democratically elected Yushchenko. His administration has sparked many of the divisive attacks on his former ally Tymoshenko. The move could plunge Ukraine into chaos and break apart its pro-Western coalition. The charge against Tymoshenko is that she sacrificed national interests in return for Kremlin support of her expected presidential candidacy in 2010. Yet, strangely, while his deputies make accusations of treason, Yushchenko has remained silent. is administration claims to have handed evidence of wrongdoing to the secret service and prosecutors. Yet Yushchenko, during Independence Day celebrations on Aug. 24, called for politicians to unite and end infighting.

Until we see evidence, we agree with recent polls that suggest the president's camp is using such accusations against Tymoshenko to boost his scant chances against her in the presidential elections.

Unless reliable evidence comes forth, we urge Yushchenko to muzzle his assistants and put his own ambitions aside. He should unify Ukraine behind the principles and goals that his Orange Revolution candidacy represented. Only this will make Ukraine's independence less fragile and produce a united leadership able to meet deep challenges ahead.


Son of ex-Georgian president says Kremlin brutality never changes

mmediately after the Russian Federation attacked Georgia, the presidents of all four European Union member countries located on Russia's borders gathered in Tbilisi to show their solidarity. This action speaks volumes in and of itself: Lithuania, Latvia, Estonia, Poland, together with non-EU member Ukraine, profoundly mistrust and fear a Vladimir Putin-led nation, as well they should, considering the long history of Russian expansion and subjugation of independent neighboring nations.

To remain with the Georgian example, this invasion is but a repeat of what happened in 1921, when my father, Noe Jordania, was president of Georgia. Then, as now, our country was resolutely democratic, which was and remains anathema to the Russian totalitarian regimes. That year, breaking a nonaggression treaty signed a scant few months before, the Bolshevik Red Army supported by the Ossetians then living in Georgia attacked and occupied the Georgian republic and forcibly incorporated it into the Soviet empire - just as the czars did in 1805, under the pretext of protecting that tiny country from the Persians and the Turks. At various times in history, all the nations bordering on Russia suffered a similar fate.

On the domestic front, with few exceptions, everybody fears Putin, knowing full well that anyone opposing or criticizing the Kremlin power runs the risk of being murdered like the journalist Anna Politkovskaya and the ex-KGB operative Alexander Litvinenko, poisoned and permanently disfigured like Ukraine's president Victor Yushchenko, jailed like the businessman Mikhail

Khodorovsky and many others, or, at best, badly beaten or roughed up like the world chess champion Gary Kasparov and his supporters who challenged the leadership in recent elections.

The sad thing is that while individually Russians can be and often are wonderful people, as a nation they seem unable to shake their acceptance and support of autocratic, dictatorial regimes. The events in Georgia demonstrate once and for all that Russia has remained basically the same throughout the centuries, whether it is called Czarist Empire, Soviet Union or Russian Federation. Hopefully, the whole world will finally realize that Russia never did and still does not function according to the democratic principles of the Western world. Russia is authoritarian, to say the least, and always has been.

Putin's official title has morphed from prime minister to president, after a travesty of an election where practically nothing changed in the power structure. He may seem himself as the forceful leader of a great country, but in reality he is very simply a ruthless dictator in the lineage of Stalin, Lenin, Peter the Great, Ivan the Terrible and practically all his predecessors in the thousand-year Russian history. His country and the world deserve better.

Redjeb Jordania is the son of Noe Jordania, the president of the first Republic of Georgia. Noe Jordania led

NATO is not Ukraine's best option

Dear Editor.

In response to your paper's monolithic "pro" stance for Ukraine's NATO entry, which you say is required immediately because of Russia's overly aggressive response in Georgia, let me offer a different view.

First, let's remember: Ukraine is not Georgia. The two countries' fates are not necessarily intertwined – not unless President Victor Yushchenko chooses to meddle in the Russia-Georgia conflict, at Ukraine's peril. Let's hope Yushchenko knows the difference between expressing words of solidarity and committing national suicide.

As an American, and a patriot, my first concern is whether Ukraine's admission into NATO is in America's interest. The answer is: No. NATO and the U.S. would gain little from Ukraine. As the Kyiv Post noted, Ukraine's conscript army is small, outdated, with terrible morale; and Ukraine cannot afford to fund its NATO commitments. Ukraine has offered radar-listening stations to NATO, but they are not of much defensive value. With all of their current satellites and listening stations, America and NATO can already see and hear what is happening in Russia. These stations are not about defense, they are about reducing Russia's nuclear first-strike capability. This means eliminating the principle of mutually assured destruction (MAD), the terrible yet terribly effective foundation for nuclear peace for the past 40 years. After attacking Iraq and Iran, this is U.S. neocons' greatest mad dream. Naturally, this worries Russia, as it should worry any unbiased observer. Renewing a nuclear arms race with Russia is not in America's, or the world's, interest. Unfortunately, the fate of the world still depends on MAD.

More importantly to your readers, NATO expansion is not in Ukraine's interest. Ukraine could gain some side advantages, yes, like some international prestige and perhaps eventual European Union membership. But overall, Ukraine is more likely to suffer badly as a result.

A majority of the Ukrainian parliament and population opposes Ukraine's membership in NATO. Moreover, the emotional intensity of the anti-NATO majority far exceeds the pro-NATO minority's, as violent anti-NATO demonstrations in Ukraine have recently shown. If Ukraine is a real democracy, public opinion - especially on such an important question - cannot be defied by one man or his cabal. Most Ukrainians recognize that Russia is very, very close, and America is very

far away, and all the rational implications.

Russia is Ukraine's No. 1 trading partner; and it provides most of Ukraine's oil and natural gas. NATO can't change that. NATO membership would leave Ukraine just as vulnerable to all kinds of Russian meddling, not the least of which would be turning off Ukraine's gas supply in the middle of winter. NATO can't stop Russia from actively fomenting separatism in Crimea and eastern Ukraine, openly and in secret. NATO can't stop Russia from cracking down on the millions of legal and illegal Ukrainians living in Russia; and NATO can't stop Russia from refusing entry to the millions more who travel to Russia each year on business or to visit family. NATO can't stop Russia from imposing crippling tariffs on Ukrainian imports, or dreaming up pretexts to declare Ukrainian products "unsafe" for consumption. Russia can afford to do all this, and take some losses, because it is swimming in Western cash from oil and gas profits. Ukraine does not enjoy the same luxury. In summary, NATO can guarantee only helplessness in the face of Russia's escalation of nonmilitary interference in Ukraine's affairs.

Thanks for posting this very important article [Aug. 14 "Got valuables? Carry them on plane when traveling at Boryspil]. I travel in Ukraine (including Boryspil) several times each year. During the summer of 2007 I inadvertently placed a \$250 Palm PDA (personal digital assistant) in my check- in luggage on a flight from Boryspil to Sevastopol, Crimea. I normally carry this wireless device on me or in my carry-on baggage and should have known better. When I arrived at my destination in Crimea, I later

discovered that the PDA was missing. I never reported this theft because it was an "act of stupidity" by me for putting the PDA in the check-in bag and many friends (Ukrainians) have warned me of such acts of thefts. This ring of theft should be aggressively eliminated from operation in Boryspil. It gives Boryspil a very negative international reputation, as well as Kyiv and Ukrainians a bad reputation. 

Group: political instability hinders investment

nna Derevyanko is executive director of the European Business Association. The group, which has more than 750 members, was established in 1999 as a forum for discussing and resolving problems facing private businesses in Ukraine. She has worked for the EBA since 2000 and was appointed executive director in 2003.

KP: What are the obstacles and barriers to foreign investment in Ukraine?

AD: I truly believe that no single country in the world boasts ideal conditions for foreign investment. There are and always will be pros and cons in any country, even a developed one. Ukraine is no exception and has many urgent issues to sort out.

First, Ukraine's inconsistent and contradictory laws and political instability are likely to put off foreign investors.

Second, the list of problems affecting Ukraine's investment climate is far from short. Land reform should have been implemented a long ago. The property regulations, technical regulations, corporate governance, taxation and nontariff regulations lack transparency and consistency, not to mention, the whole legal system requires reform.

Despite all the problems, a great number of foreign businessmen have gotten accustomed to our national peculiarities and worked out their own approaches to fighting against "red tape" inconveniences.

KP: Can you compare the investment climate of 2008 to that of 2003?

AD: Despite political uncertainty and economic turbulence, on average the investment sector has demonstrated a undoubtedly positive dynamic over the past few years. The volume of foreign investment has increased, exceeding \$21 billion at the end of 2007. So, we can draw the conclusion that there is slow but constant progress towards a better investment climate in Ukraine.

Still, in order to make Ukraine's investment environment conducive and attractive to foreign business, priority should be given to reforming the legal system in order to remove all current conflicts and ambiguities. Furthermore, once adopted, all laws and regulations must be properly enforced and executed at all levels of state authoritiy and in business communities.

KP: What problems are foreign investors most likely to face in Ukraine?

AD: Foreign investors face a range of problems depending on their business.

Manufacturers suffer from certification and standardization inconsistencies, but land use regulations are the most pressing. Land reforms should be introduced and implemented immediately in order to enable a businessman to invest money

in production, which inevitably requires purchasing or renting land plots.

Importers have to overcome problems caused by customs, whereas exporters end up combating non-transparent regulations on VAT [value added tax] refunds.

KP: What do you think about foreign investors privatizing strategic factories or plants – for example, those that process chemicals or oil -- in Ukraine?

AD: Our government should develop and maintain a clear privatization strategy including a list of enterprises subject and not subject to privatization. They should also introduce rules for companies wishing to participate in a privatization procedure. It is difficult to comment on this issue until the government develops a clear-cut strategy.

KP: What is your view on investment politics in Ukraine's regions?

AD: Every single region of our country is unique. But it is very difficult to talk about developed cooperation between separate regions at the moment, as there is no single national strategy.

So far, every region is developing its own investment strategy based on its resources and potential. For example, many European companies have already launched production operations in the Lviv and Uzhgorod regions. They export their product to the European Union and the rest of the world.

Eastern Ukraine has huge industrial resources, while the south boasts of being a Black Sea gateway and has high sea-resort potential.

Still, the development of a national strategy is an issue of vital importance and urgency. I would like to emphasize that this strategy must be well-thoughtout, explicit and easy to understand, creating a sound foundation for the country's stability and prosperity.

KP: Has the U.S. subprime crisis impacted the inflow of investment to Ukraine?

AD: The U.S. subprime crisis has influenced the global economy, including Ukraine. Everything depends on whether Ukraine can take advantage of the situation. But we have to combine our efforts and jointly work out a strategic plan on how to make Ukraine attractive for multinational investors.

Being able to buy anything online and therefore anonymously, also means that you can freely go with your wants and needs, unhampered by embarrassment, humbleness, or unwillingness to personally show up at certain stores. Does this actually promote a free society or lowers morals remains a question.

Working remotely in America becomes more and more common. Usually you can get a couple of days when you can "work from home." If you are "unlucky" though and actually have to be physically present at work, you usually end up spending hours (sometimes, days) in the office without having to utter a word. Google Talk, Yahoo Messenger, MSN, Sametime - these are no longer just for fun chatting programs, they are formal tools for business communication at work. There are even manuals on how to lead a professional conversation over an instant messenger. So, why talk if you can type.

Even customer service gets more and more impersonalized in America. The 1-800 numbers always have the automated phone service that picks up the calls. "Press 1 if you need to order a new service, Press 2 to change the address." You can actually go up to 10, before you get the "speak to a customer representative" option. Frankly, I usually give up before then.

And, finally, the social networking phenomenon has flooded Americans. On social networking sites, like MySpace and my absolute favorite, Facebook, the participation rates are staggering, as is the amount and type of information participants freely reveal. Profile entries, blog and forum posts, user reviews or tags – all these contribute to a virtual life. Not having a reason to leave the house, with no live communication, people have a need to share as much they can and feel "included" in the communities. Conscientiously, keeping your Facebook profile up-todate seems like the new way of doing that

With no sunlight or live communication, it is not surprising that depression is a national disease in America and that obesity is a national challenge. I am glad to know that Ukraine is not there vet.

Baiul opens up about her life, charity work

KP: Oksana, in the 14 years since you dazzled the world with your Lillehammer victory, Ukraine hasn't heard a lot about its ice princess. Now you have a chance to tell the real story of Oksana Baiul.

OB: I agree, the world has collected many questions about what has been really going on in my life. It's just about time to answer them. That is why I am writing an autobiography, which is planned to come out in 2010 and will be my gift to the Olympics. I'm working on my second book as well, which is for "skating moms"-parents who spend their days on the skating rink. This book is like therapy to me, because I lost my mother at a very early age. Only later in life did I realize how huge of a shock it was. First, my grandparents died, then I lost my mom to cancer. My first coach emigrated to Canada. All that happened during the tough period of the Soviet Union's collapse and there was absolutely no one to help me wade through life. I packed my things, threw my skates into a bag and left for Odesa [from Dnipropetrovsk], where coaches Galina Zmievskaya and Valentin Nikolaev took me into their group. Soon I became a part of the national figure skating team and took silver at the Ukrainian and European championships. For Ukraine, as well as for my coaches, it was a huge surprise. By the time we arrived at the World Championship in Prague, I already felt like a very strong athlete, and I won. In the world of figure skating, the person who wins the world championship right before the Olympics becomes a favorite. I burst into the world like lightning. Victory brought me instantaneous fame and the title, "princess of figure skating." Fairy tales are not possible without princesses, and some American producers invited me to the United States. For the next 10 years, I participated in the tour "Champions on Ice." For 10 years in a row, we covered more than 110 small and large cities per year.

KP: Do you have any regrets?

OB: I regret that I switched to professional sports [from amateur competitions]


so early. When I was 16, 17 and 18, I didn't understand the gift I had been given from above. I considered the Olympics to be the apex from which there was nowhere higher to jump. Figure skating is the only sport that forbids skaters who have become professionals to switch [back again] to amateur competitions [such as the Olympics and championships]. Maybe if I had remained in Ukraine and hadn't left the amateur sport, I would have won my second, third, and fourth Olympics. But the absence of decent conditions for figure skating development in Ukraine defined my choice.

KP: What are the major activities you dedicate yourself to now?

OB: The Broadway show "Cold as Ice," which is expected to come out by 2010, is my life now. It takes time to put together such a grand show. The cast consists of 26 people, when a normal Broadway show takes only about 11 or 12 people. This year we are to present it in Canada, later in Florida. Also, I dedicate myself to the writing of my two books. Other than that, I am preparing for my tour, which will include Ukraine and Russia as well.

KP: Please, tell us about your ties to me sooner or later. Ukraine.

OB: When I turned 25, I found the **KP:** What about your private life?



KP: Where do you get your inspiration from?

OB: Inspiration as well as talent can be given from only above. That is why even a truly gifted person can not be inspired 24 hours a day. Also, I prefer to work with great professionals, who always demand a lot from you. They all possess incredibly strong personalities and always put pressure on you. I love that. Talent and creativity come from God, but outstanding outcomes require dedication as well. However, all these choices are my choices.

KP: What is the one thing you would like to change in your life?

OB: My lack of patience. I am an incredibly impatient person and every time I have to beg: "God, please, give me patience." There is an enormous inflow of information and work, so I want everything and immediately. But life doesn't work like that.

KP: Winning and losing: what advice would you give to our young generation of skaters?

OB: There are no failures. A negative result is also a result. The presence of negative and positive creates the balance. If there are only positive things taking place, later there will be only negative ones. I view negative results as positive, draw conclusions and try to improve next time.

It's about the quality of the product. If I want to perform or write a book, I don't want it to feel manufactured. I want it to include a part of my soul that people can feel. It is essential for me to be a "real" person, in that when I don't like something, I can always say, "I don't like this."

Hot jobs offered by foreign companies

ey, all you college students! Wondering what profession to choose and where to land the highest paid job upon graduation?

Well, recruiters in Kviv say that regardless of what career you opt for, foreign companies operating in Ukraine generally

pay 30 to 40 percent higher salaries and offer stronger benefit packages, including free mobile phone service, laptops, lunches and cars for top managers.

But before you even think of landing a job in a foreign company, brush up on your English. Fluent English is a must, no longer just a plus, experts say.

The positions most in demand nowadays, in addition to lawyers, are public relations, human resource, marketing and sales managers.

Long gone is the Soviet mindset of doing business, when a high-ranking apparatchik would order factories to churn out massive amounts of goods without putting effort into a sales strategy. Now that Ukraine has embarked

down the road of free market and competitive economics, the role of salesmanship is high up on the agenda of companies, be they domestic producers or foreign companies importing their goods into the country.

"In order to make money, companies now realize they need to sell whatever it is they produce LIST or offer on the market," said Pavlo Logay, chief executive at World Staff, a top management recruitment company.

> Thus it's no surprise that the highest number of job offerings, some 15 percent of listings in World Staff's database, are for sales managers. Logay added that monthly salaries typically offered for such positions are between \$1,000 and \$2,000.

Next in demand, and well-paid at that, are lawyers.

"Five years ago, lawyers were in such high demand that even a medical school had a law faculty," said Logay. He noted that listings for lawyers tapered off a few years ago, but are back up this year, accounting for some 13 to 14 percent of open positions listed by companies in World Staff's database.

sitions, and overall business activity in Ukraine booming, companies are competing for qualified lawyers again.

According to Personnel Executive, a recruitment agency, lawyers typically earn monthly salaries between \$1,500 and \$2,000.

However, "senior lawyers can make up to \$15,000 per month," added Veronika Bodashko, a partner at Personnel Executive. With demand as high as it is, the growth opportunities for lawyers are strong. After several years of experience, lawyers have a real shot at becoming partners in law firms. The same process can take a decade or more in highly competitive western markets.

If you are not excited about sales or

law, your best bet for a well-paid job is in the marketing, public relations and human resource management sectors. Nearly 30 percent of all jobs listed in World Staff's database are for these professions, and salaries range from \$1,000 to \$5.000.

And if you're a hi-tech guru, your best chances are, of course, to secure a job as a programmer or a related position in Ukraine's dynamic software development business, which relies heavily on foreign contract work.

According to IT Personnel recruitment agency, salaries in this segment fluctuate from \$500 to \$2,500, but many successful programmers opt to work as freelancers, seeking out lucrative contracts of their own.

The company is among the largest business process outsourcers operating in the Middle and Eastern European markets since 1991, with regional offices in Prague, Budapest, Moscow, Bucharest, Warsaw, Bratislava and now Kyiv. Elanor serves more than 350 companies, performing monthly payroll processing for at least 30,000 employees of its client companies.

In his interview with the Post, Marovec said payroll outsourcing is the way of the future for companies to cut costs and to concentrate on their core business, leaving accounting to professionals.

KP: What are the benefits for using payroll outsourcing today?

LM: For a company, using a payroll outsourcing typically costs less than hiring an additional employee to handle payroll. Let

Today employers pay about 37 percent of their employees' salaries to a social fund. Add here those things that an employee gets paid for employees, such as office space, equipment, training, administrative costs. What I'm saying is that the real cost of the employee jumps to \$2500 per month, while we can offer the same services for \$1500 per month. The capital freed up by outsourcing can be invested more profitably in the business.

Moreover, it may be hard for the in-house payroll department to keep all the regulatory changes. Elanor currently employs 10 highly qualified specialists who have the latest knowledge. One payroll specialist is responsible for monthly payroll for approximately 800 employees. If a mistake does happen, we assume all penalties that may come as a result of incorrect tax calculations.

KP: How do you protect confidential information?

LM: The security of payroll data is very important to us. We develop special software data

Today, we have international customers, experiencing the need to bring Ukrainian payroll report in line with their corporate reporting standards. Because many of them deliver accounting reports to their headquarters, our payroll solution is able to import and export payroll data to the main accounting databases such as SAP, Oracle.

KP: Is payroll outsourcing the most promising direction of work in Ukraine?

LM: The market penetration of payroll services in the US has already exceeded 85 percent. For comparison, Western Europe has a 65-70 percent penetration rate. There are only few international qualified providers on the Ukrainian accounting market. Payroll outsourcing services in Ukraine are, for the most part, provided by auditing companies from "Big Four". But I can say that Ukraine follows the international trend and there is a lot of potential for this business in the future.

As demand exceeds supply on job market, salaries rise

atiana Kolombet, a commercial director at the Ukrainian branch of Brain Source International recruitment agency, has more than five years of experience in the business. The Russian national kicked off her career in Moscow at CT Personnel, relocating to Kyiv in 2005. Kolombet says that both foreign and domestic companies are fighting for employees in Ukraine, where job offerings exceed qualified professionals.

KP: How is the job market doing with the influx of foreign companies , and what jobs are highest in demand?

TK: In Ukraine, we have a situation where demand is higher [than supply]. Every foreign company entering the market needs a lawyer, and they

want the one of the highest caliber, but Ukraine does not have enough qualified lawyers to fill this demand. Some companies opt to hire lawyers with two years of experience and then train them.

Others invite people from their home country.

KP: As Ukrainian companies get more sophisticated and adapt to Western business practices, are they looking to the international labor market for specialists, and hiring more foreigners?

TK: Brain Source International has

received more and more requests for foreign employees. Companies are ready to pay higher salaries and generous bonuses, but they are still not ready to pay all salaries officially. Sometimes the owners or top-managers of Ukrainian companies do not speak English, so the search field becomes narrower: Russia or Poland.

KP: How competitive is the job market? How often do professionals switch companies in search of higher salaries and benefits, and how are companies instilling employee loyalty?

TK: We have seen the development of a job-hopping trend. Companies are fighting for good employees. And it is the responsibility of HR departments to [find ways of retaining good workers]. Today the minimum of what an employee can ask for in terms of benefits is paid mobile communication and a laptop computer. It's getting common for top managers to be offered a corporate car. A social package, free lunches and career growth opportunities are also strong factors affecting employee loyalty.

KP: What is your forecast for Ukraine's recruitment market in the near future? What specialists will be most in demand?

TK: First of all, a qualified professional is always in high demand, no matter what the profession. For the past two years, we have observed an increasing demand for lawyers. And sales managers have always been in demand.

EU fears Russia may target Ukraine

PARIS, Aug 27 (Reuters) – Russia might have its eye on other neighbouring countries such as Ukraine and Moldova after its armed forces stormed Georgia, French Foreign Minister Bernard Kouchner said on Aug. 27.

Russia's armed forces overpowered Georgia's troops earlier this month after Tbilisi tried to retake control of the breakaway region of South Ossetia.

Russian troops continue to occupy parts of Georgia, and Moscow recognized South Ossetia and another rebel region of Georgia, Abkhazia, as independent states on Aug 26, prompting strong criticism from France and other Western powers.

Asked on Europe 1 radio whether Russia would now regularly choose to confront the West rather than cooperate with it, Kouchner said: "That is not impossible."

⁴I repeat that it is very dangerous, and there are other objectives that one can suppose are objectives for Russia, in particular the Crimea, Ukraine and Moldova," said Kouchner, whose country holds the European Union's rotating presidency. EU Enlargement Commissioner Olli Rehn said the EU should clearly signal its support for Ukraine's efforts to join the bloc in light of a possible threat from Russia.

"Ukraine could be the next political pressure point for Russia. Therefore, it is important from a stability point of view to send a positive signal that it is possible for Ukraine to progress towards the Union," Rehn said in Helsinki.

EU leaders are due to hold a longscheduled summit with Ukrainian President Victor Yushchenko on Sept. 9 in the French Alpine town of Evian.

Like Georgia, Ukraine has a pro-Western president who wants his country to join NATO, a move away from Moscow's sphere of influence which has angered the Kremlin. It also has a large Russian-speaking population, but is much bigger than Georgia.

The Crimea, in southern Ukraine, hosts Russia's Black Sea fleet at the port of Sevastopol under a lease that runs until 2017, and most people who live there are ethnic Russians.

Yushchenko has angered Moscow by suggesting Kyiv may not renew the lease.

Russian President Dmitry Medvedev warned another former Soviet republic, Moldova, on Aug. 25 not to make the same mistake as Georgia by trying to seize back control of its breakaway pro-Russian region, Transdniestria.

The 27-nation EU is holding an emergency summit on Sept. 1 and is still considering how best to respond to Russia's actions in the conflict and to its decision to recognize Georgia's rebel regions.

EU envoys on Aug. 26 asked planners to look at options for a civilian monitoring mission in Georgia, but agreed it would be premature to send armed peacekeepers into the region.

"However that would not be ruled out as part of a global settlement in accord with the United Nations," said one diplomat. Any such settlement could be difficult if it needed the backing of the Security Council where Russia has a veto.

The fate of recently-launched negotiations over a new EU-Russia strategic partnership is in doubt, but Kouchner has played down suggestions that the EU should launch sanctions against Russia.

Survey: More Ukrainians want Russia's fleet out

Moscow's actions in Georgia have increased anti-Russian sentiment in Ukraine, as more Ukrainians now want the Russian Black Sea Fleet out of their nation's Crimean Peninsula, a poll conducted Aug. 14-19 suggests.

The poll, conducted by the Kyiv International Institute of Sociology, found that 29 percent of Ukrainians want Russia's Black Sea Fleet to leave its base in Sevastopol when the lease agreement expires in 2017, while 17 percent want the fleet out immediately. The total for both is 7 percent more than a poll conducted by the institute two months ago. Some 27 percent of Ukrainians polled want the Russian fleet to remain in Ukraine, while another 27 percent was undecided.

When the USSR collapsed, both countries wrestled over the Sevastopolbased fleet. Ultimately, Kyiv conceded most of it, but has in recent years pushed Moscow to initiate removal preparations. The conflict with Georgia left Ukraine particularly uncomfortable as Russian vessels based on its soil were used against another pro-western ally. The poll also showed that 50 percent of Ukrainians saw a military threat to their country, in connection with the fleet being based on home soil.

Yevhen Khmilko, director of the institute that conducted the poll, said Russia's moves in Georgia were the "main reason" for the increase in support for removal of the fleet.

The biggest changes in public opinion were fixed in Ukraine's Russian-leaning eastern regions, Khmilko said adding that 22 percent more (from 11 to 33 percent) of eastern Ukrainians want the fleet out compared to prior polls. The number of eastern Ukrainians that want Russia's fleet to stay decreased by 17 percent, from 62 to 45 percent.

In the also Russian-speaking southern parts of Ukraine, a slight 2 percent more want the fleet out immediately, 9.5 percent compared to 11.5 percent. The number of southern Ukrainians who want the fleet out in 2017 increased slightly from 20.5 percent to 23 percent. Still, a large share of southern and eastern Ukrainians want the fleet to stay in Crimea, while most citizens in the west want it out.

CONFLICT, continued from page 1 signals a new world order, one which raises the question of how far Ukraine's northern neighbor is willing to go to pursue its interests. Some wonder whether Ukraine, the other rare ex-Soviet Western ally besides Georgia, could be Moscow's next target.

Yet another question is whether Russia's show of domination has sidelined the West's attempts at encouraging democracy and energy diversification in the region, where Ukraine and Georgia are seen as key transit countries in bypassing Russia's grip over oil and gas supplies.

As Russia challenged Western interests, Ukraine's leadership remained as divided as ever. The Moscow-leaning opposition leader, Victor Yanukovych, embraced Russia's recognition of South Ossetia and Abkhazia. But President Victor Yushchenko, in a letter published by the Washington Post, warned his country was becoming "a hostage to the war waged by Russia."

The president's administration has waged war in the domestic political arena, accusing Prime Minister Yulia Tymoshenko of wavering in the Georgia conflict, supposedly to win Kremlin support for her presumed candidacy in the 2010 presidential election. The public's opinion was a mirror image of these divisions. A poll commissioned by the Segodnya newspaper and carried out by the Research & Branding Group Aug. 14-18 showed that the public is equally divided between supporting Russia, sympathizing with Georgia, or abstaining from supporting any side.

Geoffrey Smith, a strategist with Renaissance Capital, said Russia's recent moves in Georgia pose no direct risk to Ukraine's territorial integrity, but could affect sentiment toward Ukrainian financial markets. The nation borders the home of another frozen conflict, namely the Moldovan breakaway region of Transdniester. Ukraine also fears Russia could challenge its sovereignty over the Crimean Peninsula.

"Russia is not content with the current status quo," Smith said, a reference to Medvedev's recognition of the two breakaway Georgian enclaves that neither of his predecessors had recognized.

"There are other frozen conflicts. Things could get very awkward," Smith said. He doubts whether Crimea will return to Russia's grip, citing the peninsula's autonomous status under the Ukrainian constitution, and lack of official support from Moscow – so far – for a revision of the 1954 agreement transferring Crimea to the Ukrainian SSR. Faced with such uncertainty, Smith said Ukraine's politicians "need to keep their cool, avoid making public outbursts" which could provoke a serious standoff with Russia or Russians living in Ukraine.

However, should Crimea's "status" change, Smith said: "it would pose a far greater risk to European peace than the Georgian conflict."

In an interview with Reuters published on Aug. 27, President Yushchenko echoed the fears of many analysts and those of his compatriots saying: "Any nation could be next, any country. When we allow someone to ignore the fundamental right of territorial integrity, we put into doubt the existence of any country." Indeed, Ukraine is wary, since 10 NATO warships are in the Black Sea with eight more expected soon.

A recently published EU think tank report said the 27-member bloc cannot afford any more delays in defining and deepening ties with Ukraine. The European Council on Foreign Relations proposed that Ukraine be given access to the EU's four freedoms of movement of goods, people, services and capital and a roadmap for visa-free travel. The report also advocates that Ukraine be offered a "clearer perspective" towards a NATO membership action plan.

Tymoshenko tops Korrespondent's ranking of powerbrokers

TOP 100, continued from page 1 and now her political foe, serves as the country's leader on paper, but trails in the ranking at third.

Yushchenko's consummate political chief of staff, Victor Baloha, follows in fourth place. Baloha is just ahead of billionaire Victor Pinchuk, the son-in-law of ex-President Leonid Kuchma, who is now in the last spot.

For the most part, however, the top 100 list is made up of the same old faces that have ruled Ukraine for years, only in different order.

This is the sixth such ranking created by Korrespondent, created with the help of an advisory board that included economists, political analysts and other experts. Their findings produced a few newcomers, but 75 percent of the list includes the same individuals as last year.

Referring to Akhmetov, in the No. 2 spot with an unrivaled fortune of \$31.1 billion, Korrespondent wrote: "The businessman operates the three most efficient instruments of influence: money, big money and very big money."

Akhmetov is followed in the rankings by about 29 billionaires and millionaires, who frequently combine their business activity with public service.

Outside of the usual movers and shakers, this year's ranking includes 25 newcomers, some of whom have reappeared on the list.

Hryhoriy Nemyria, vice prime minister

in charge of European integration, is one of Tymoshenko's confidants and shot up to the 25th spot. He arrived in politics only a few years ago after an academic career and years of activity in civic society initiatives, helping him develop close ties to Brussels and diplomats in Ukraine.

Three of the most influential are foreigners, including television host Savik Shuster, Moscow Mayor Yuri Luzhkov and American Gene Van Dyke, owner of Houston-based gas and oil exploration company Vanco Energy.

Shuster's weekly political talk show is one of the most-watched Ukrainian programs and serves as a boxing ring for the country's politicians.

Political analyst Kost Bondarenko said

Luzhkov and Van Dyke were big newsmakers in 2008.

Luzhkov has led a push by Russia challenging Ukraine's territorial claims to the Crimean Peninsula, where Russia's Black Sea Fleet is based until a lease expires in 2017.

Van Dyke's Vanco Energy secured a massive hydrocarbon oil and gas exploration and production project off the Crimean coast. Yushchenko has defended the project, which is partially backed by Akhmetov. But Tymoshenko is challenging it on grounds that the investors had been awarded too large of a field. She also suspects the investors are tied to Russian energy giant Gazprom.

Only 10 women made the ranking,

including Yushchenko's wife Kateryna (29), Yanukovych confidant Raisa Bogateriova (9) and well-known writer Oksana Zabuzhko (72). Pinchuk's wife, Olena Franchuk, ranked 83, a bit above Kuchma, her father and Ukraine's expresident.

"There are obviously few new faces, especially, among young politicians," said Vasyl Yurchyshyn, director of economic programs at Razumkov Center for Political and Economic Studies, who has contributed to Korrespondent's assessment. "Therefore, we can hardly expect changes in [the country's stormy] politics. Most likely, the situation will repeat, with dominating politicians merely exchanging places.

Triumphant return for Olympic team

The Ukrainian national Olympic team returned from Beijing with a record number of medals, but not scandal-free. Ukraine's athletes came home with 27 medals, of which seven were gold, five silver and 15 bronze. Their performance exceeded expectations and bested their Athens medal count by four.

The team's performance placed Ukraine 10th in total medals and 11th in most gold medals among 204 participating countries. China surpassed everyone with 51 golden medals (out of 100 total medals), with team USA in second with 36 gold medals (110 total) and Russia in third place with 23 golden medals (72 altogether).

Archery, team fencing, shooting, boxing, athletics and canoeing were Ukraine's most successful sports. Upon their return, the Ukrainian team was congratulated by National Olympic Committee president Serhiy Bubka, the Cabinet of Ministers and President Viktor Yushchenko.

Earlier this month the government increased cash rewards for medalists and their trainers who will receive Hr 700,000 for gold, Hr 500,000 for silver and Hr 350,000 for bronze medal. Moreover, during the next two years, medalists and their coaches will receive the monthly stipend of Hr 15,000 for those who placed first, Hr 12,000 for second and Hr 10,000 for third.

However, the Olympic team was

doping tests: silver medalist Lyudmila Blonska and weightlifter Igor Razoronov both of whom were disqualified from the event.

tainted by two athletes who failed

The 30-year-old Blonska has already served a two-year ban after testing positive for steroid use in 2003. Now she was stripped of her heptathlon silver medal and faces a lifetime ban from competitive sports. However, the Ukrainian athlete confessed she was using methyl-testosterone and blamed her husband and coach of physically abusing her and forcing her to use the male hormone.

The 33-year-old Igor Razorov tested positive for the steroid nandrolone after finishing sixth in the 105-kilogram weight class. The International Olympic Committee asked the international weightlifting federation to adjust the competition results and consider any further sanctions for Ukrainian. The federation banned him from the sport for two years.

Also, Anna Bessonova, who took a bronze in the all round rhythmicgymnastics discipline, filed an appeal between the third and fourth round of the competition based on what she thought was unfair judging.

Following the spectacular closing ceremony of the Beijing Games, London officially took over as the next 2012 Olympic host city. The UK Olympics will have a smaller budget - 9.3 billion pounds. London will play host to the Summer Olympic Games for the third time.

More upscale clients buy helicopters, skip traffic jams

For most people, flying to work is a dream. For the lucky few, it's a dream come true.

As city roads in Ukraine have clogged up over the last few years, the idea of owning a private helicopter has taken off, despite Ukrainian laws that prohibit city overflights and landing on rooftops.

Yury Romanenko, a businessman from Rivne, is one the 150 or so helicopter owners in Ukraine, 30 of which – companies and individuals included - are in Kyiv.

Romanenko, a businessman with interests in petroleum trading and investment brokering, bought his fourseat chopper three years ago, and keeps it on a small pad outside his private President of the Kyiv Aeronautics Association.

Many of Ukraine's billionaires are known to have flashy choppers and jets of their own, yet a growing number of up-and-coming businessmen are also starting to invest in the time-saving travel that choppers can offer.

Four years ago, Kobrynsky and his

friends decided to fill the niche of light aviation in Ukraine and started selling helicopters. Doing so, ironically, required Kobrynsky to overcome a personal challenge – the fear of flying.

After 73 hours of ground school and 50 hours of flight lessons he received an international license and was able to fly



a helicopter solo. That is when he saw his chance.

"There is an absolute vacuum of small aviation in Ukraine. In Soviet times, there were many professional Ukrainian pilots, but the old professionals retired and there were few flight schools training replacements. We decided to be the pioneers," he added.

In 2004, with little money, he founded one of Ukraine's first helicopter businesses, teaching pilots and selling the machines.

Kobrynsky's first helicopter was made by Robinson, an American firm that has been making private family helicopters for over three decades. A year later, he persuaded the Ministry of Transportation to authorize the building of his own helicopter pad and hangar large enough to service a half-dozen aircraft on Kyiv's Hydropark Island. But, regardless of the price and strict licensing procedures, demand is on the rise.

In two years, the number of companies selling helicopters will at least double, according to estimates by the Kyiv Aeronautics Association.

At his helo pad on the banks of the Dnipro, Kobrynsky is in his element. He controls everything; he rolls helicopters out of their shelters onto the tarmac, and thoroughly examines each one before going aloft. On a clear blue day, he took this Kyiv Post reporter into the sky over the Dnipro for a view of the city that few ever see but many would like to.

Flying a helicopter is very different than flying a plane. It's perfect for those who easily get motion sickness. The takeoff and landing are so soft you barely notice. Seeing the pilot in front of you is reassuring. And, of course, the most amazing thing in the helicopter is the ability to open the window, not possible in an airplane.

house.

"The level of noise from a helicopter is very low, so neighbors don't complain," Romanenko said.

With a flying speed of up to 220 kilometers per hour, he can fly almost 600 kilometers without refueling. Roughly speaking, at such speeds, one can fly from Kyiv to Lviv in about 2 hours with roughly \$300 in fuel costs. That's double the cost of driving to Lviv from Kyiv in an economy class car, but it will save you about four hours.

Despite the fact that the first flying helicopter was designed by Igor Sikorsky, a Kyivan who emigrated to the West, a mass of cars, trains, buses and planes still dominate travel in Ukraine.

But those in the helicopter business expect sales to pick up in coming years.

"The majority of our clients are quite well off," said Andriy Kobrynsky,

Andriy Kobrynsky, president of the Kyiv Aeronautics Association, started selling helicopters four years ago to a mostly rich clientele. (Iryna $\mathsf{Prymachyk})$

While time-saving advantages of the helicopter are obvious, they come with a heavy price tag. You would have to pay about \$500,000 for a four-seat Robinson-44.

Apart from Robinsons, other companies in Kyiv sell American-made Sikorsky and French-made Eurocopter, but they are much more expensive, and usually take between six and 36 months to assemble after full payment. A fiveseat Sikorsky would roughly cost \$3 million.

Flight training is costly too. After a minimum of 50 hours of schooling, worth over \$25,000, a pilot receives his license. The license needs to be renewed every two years.

"Such strictness in licensing is needed because flying a helicopter is not easy; it is not like driving a car," said Kobrynsky, "and pilots must pass rigorous physicals because any health problem could lead to tragedy." One of the disadvantages, though, is high turbulence. Helicopters are light and shift abruptly when wind picks up.

Looking ahead, helicopter enthusiasts say Ukraine is short of service infrastructure for choppers.

"Imagine if you drive from Kyiv to Donetsk on the car and there were no petrol stations on the way," says Serhiy Solomko, a Kyiv design engineer.

"It will take time [for the country] to adapt to light aviation."

Kobrynsky is optimistic. He says demand has doubled over that last year, infrastructure and legislation will soon follow.

"In a few decades our kids will tell us 'Dad, when I grow up I want to be a chopper pilot," he predicts.







s editor of an entertainment section, I frequently get invitations to various social events. That includes presentations of music videos, press openings of posh new clubs and anniversaries of restaurants. And also because of my job, I have to get out and mingle, so I try to visit at least some of these events, but every time I do it grudgingly, since it can easily turn out to be a waste of time. Whenever I go out to such a party with high expectations, I'm likely to leave it dissapointed. It's not that I'm hoping for royal treatment, but knowing well what the media does for all those newborn pop stars and fancy joints, I suppose my desire to be entertained is well justified.

Sending out invitations to an opening or presentation, promoters often try to tempt the press with promise of a buffet, but experienced party hoppers know - "buffet" is a loose concept. Sometimes it can mean a few tiny sandwiches with salo and cubes of Rosiyskiy cheese with vodka - the worst; or it can be made up of slices of smoked salmon, caviar on bits of baguette and crackers with pate, as well as wine – satisfactory; finally you may get parmesan, carpaccio, seafood, oysters, and Moet & Chandon. The latter is a rare case, but you can still manage to hit the jackpot from time to time. Of course, even such a treat is unlikely to attract me unless I'm going to be in good company. The crowd can be another reason to go to a party. But the sad truth is, unless an event is of high importance in VIP society, it's mostly attended by journalists and people seeking extra attention. The last party I attended was a premiere at a posh movie theater. The cinema bar was crowded with solarium-tanned women, fixing their hair extensions, smug boys in sunglasses, and other individuals taking great pains to look significant and get noticed by photographers and cameramen. If I wasn't with a friend, I'd skip the movie and escape. Unfortunately, I get this feeling very frequently at "socials" like this. It's probably because I'm extremely allergic to phonies, and find this whole vanity fair just irritating and boring.

The Australian Pink Floyd Show is coming to Kyiv with a stunning new live performance: "The Wall Tour 2008." When I first heard about it, I thought, if it isn't the real Pink Floyd, then I'll probably give them a miss. But very soon I changed my mind. It turns out that real Pink Flovd fans around the world have already discovered this show, and found it to be much more than an average tribute act.

The Australian Pink Floyd Show was formed in 1988 in Adelaide, South Australia, but wasn't known as this until relocating to the United Kingdom. Now the act is almost 20 years old, but the team still manages to draw considerable crowds. The band has gained a huge reputation all over Festival, the biggest annual music fest in the UK. They are also the only Pink Floyd tribute band to have performed at the Royal Albert Hall, having been joined on stage by the choir from the Islington Green School for a cover of "Another Brick in the Wall" in 2001, and again sold out on the same location in 2007.

The band performed at several major European music festivals, including the Sweden Rock Festival, the Malta Jazz Festival, the Arrow Rock Festival, Rock Werchter and the Festival do Sudoeste. Their recent shows include not only music originally written by Pink Floyd, but also a psychedelic lightshow with video screens, amazing light and some surprises – a giant,

album, the band plays songs from all periods of Pink Floyd's oeuvre, including early material by Syd Barrett and longer songs such as "Dogs and Echoes." They also play later material from the albums "The Wall," "The Final Cut," "Momentary Lapse of Reason" and "The Division Bell." Recently, the group has begun to include theatrics in their performances like Ian Cattell sitting in an armchair watching television and singing "Nobody Home," an allusion to the similar scene from the film "The Wall." Memorable songs beloved by many are synced note for note with the light and video show, including "Shine on You Crazy Diamond," "Set the Controls for the Heart of the Sun" (from Pink Floyd's second album, "A

(complete with a fake helicopter and search light scanning the crowd). There is also some really great material from "The Wall," including "Wish You Were Here," an absolutely explosive version of "Comfortably Numb" (about 15 minutes long, with gigantic disco ball descending from the ceiling), and a ripping version of "Run Like Hell." The Sunday Times once called them "The best tribute band in the world!" and Liverpool Echo magazine - "The living embodiment of a Floyd show. If you love the Floyd, you'll love this."



Who's this? Learn about most curious monuments in Kyiv

yiv is scattered with monuments, from the tightest alleyways, to house yards and squares. They can be grand, tiny, ridiculous, majestic, witty, hidden somewhere behind the corner or towering above the city's skyline.

We pass them several times each day. Tour guides show them to guests of the city. We take pictures of them, but frankly speaking, we barely know anything about most of them.

Most of us Ukrainians know the basic history behind the personalities represented by some of most popular statues in Kyiv, including that to Cossack hero Bohdan Khmelnitsky, the poet Taras Shevchenko and Communist leader Vladimir Lenin.

But there are a great many less popular figures that we come across while wandering around the streets of Kyiv. Many locals, and even some historians, wouldn't recognize them.

Take for example the statue of a guy in a hat sitting with a cup of coffee on Passage walkway right off Khreshchatyk, Kyiv's main street. The statue is always surrounded by tourists, who try to perch by the figure and take pictures. The monument is dedicated to the well-known modernist architect Vladislav Horodetsky, who lived in Kyiv at the beginning of the 20th century. Among his creations is the impressive House of Chimeras on Bankova Street, which is now the reception hall for the president when meeting foreign dignitaries. Among many buildings in Kyiv, he also designed Budynok Aktora (Actor's House) on Yaroslaviv Val. The architect once lived in the above-mentioned House of Chimeras, which is covered with statues of animals he saw on his safari trips to Africa.

You might ask, why is his statue on Passage alley? Well, from his residence, he used to walk down to this street regularly for a cup of coffee, much like many city residents do today.

The street still gathers a handful of the city's most posh cafes and coffee houses. So why not follow Horodetsky's footsteps making your way to this alley for a sweet with a cup of tea or coffee.

After you get your dose of caffeine, walk a less than a block up from Passage to Horodetskoho Street, and further up

to Ploshcha Ivana Franka, where you can see another hidden monument dedicated to actor Mykola Yakovchenko.

The bronze figure sitting on a bench with a dachshund Fan-Fan at his feet and pigeons flying about somehow fits in naturally with the city landscape and citizens walking by. The actor performed on the stage of the adjacent Ivan Franko Theater from 1928 and in 2000 the monument was opened to commemorate his 100th birth date

Relax. Lounge on a bench, feed the birds, and, of course, wait for the first bell to ring, calling you to the theater's next performance.

An intriguing character can be seen on Prorizna, the street that bisects Khreshchatyk and rises up to Ukraine's Golden Gate monument.

It's the statue to Panikovsky, a major character in the novel 'Zolotoy Telenok' ('The Golden Calf) by Odesa-born authors Ilya Ilf and Evgeniy Petrov, both famous Soviet-day writers.

A swindler and a goose-robber, Panikovsky helped the main hero of the novel, Ostap Bender, blackmail a closet millionaire.

According to the story, before the revolution Panikovsky lived in Kyiv and earned money pretending to be blind. He begged a respectable looking gentleman to walk him across Khreshchatvk. On the other side of the road, the gentleman would discover his wallet or watch was missing. The location for the monument on Prorizna wasn't chosen solely for standing close to his "working place." At the beginning of the 20th century, the street was known as a regular gathering point for swindlers.

If you walk up Prorizna to Kyiv's Golden Gate, a small bronze cat statue in the vicinity might catch your eye. For those who don't know the story behind this cat, well here it is, and it's a tragic tale at that.

The owner of the nearby restaurant, Pantagruel, decided to let a cat to a much larger monument of Yaroslav named Pantusha live inside the eatery. Soon the cat became a favorite with visitors. However once the restaurant caught fire, killing the poor pet. The restaurant's patron renovated the restaurant, of course, and insisted a small monument be erected in memory of the cat.

If you haven't had enough of statues yet for the day, walk a block further down Zolotovoritska Street to the intersection with Reytarska Street.

At this junction, you will see a sun-



Back to school: Time to shop for uniforms, backpacks and more

ummer heat is over at last and we can already smell autumn in the air. For many kids and their parents it also means that school time has arrived.

While singles are busy trying to capitalize on the last warm days on city beaches or resorts, many parents are busy shopping for their youngsters - and many of them at school fairs and markets across the city. If you are out there walking around Kyiv, you have probably already caught sight of families making their way between vendors, inquiring about prices, buying everything necessary - from clothing, books to pencils to prepare children for school.

The full set of school wear and accessories can be found in the various shopping centers in the capital. But fans of socalled school fairs and markets say they are the best place to buy everything that your kid will, or may, need in one place.

You can find books, drawing-albums, painting kits and all school necessities at one of the biggest school fairs in Kyiv located on Khreschatyk next to TSUM shopping center. If you've got kids, but haven't made your way there yet, don't panic. Its open until Sept. 5.

Discounts, some 5 percent, are offered to all customers on a wide assortment of goods for those who prefer weekend shopping.

School uniforms on Khreschatyk cost almost the same as at any children's wear store but the choice is said to be much wider. The market carries school clothes by Ukrainian manufactures Milana and Yunist, which have been making clothes for Ukrainian school boys and girls for the past 70 years.

School jackets are Hr 200 to Hr 250, pants - Hr 80 to Hr 150. Shirts for school uniform can be bought there also: white shirts with short or long sleeves at the school market cost from Hr 30. Girl's school uniform will cost you a bit more. For an apron with shirt-blouse or skirt with jacket you'll pay Hr 180 to Hr 300. For a vest – Hr 70, tights and kneelength socks – Hr 50. And don't forget about those funny but sweet huge white hair bows - Hr 25.

> One of the main goals in school shopping is purchasing a kid's backpack. Your best bet for finding a good satchel with a orthopedic back and various pockets for books, pencils and copybooks may not be one of the fairs, but kid stores such as Kazka-Nova or Antoshka. They carry a range of backpacks for Hr 120 to Hr 200. Never mind the cheap backpacks, costing Hr 60 to Hr 70. As a rule, they are painted in very bright almost acid colors, and get dirty very quickly. It's may be a good idea to choose a backpack with

light reflectors, which is a precautionary measure against road incidents for when your kid will be returning from school in winter times, when it gets dark early.

Everyday school accessories should not only be useful, but also fun for kids. So it's best to choose something colorful. Various ball pens cost about Hr 0.40 0.60, a set of pens with colored ink are Hr 3 to Hr 7, pencils cost Hr 1.5 to Hr 2 and crayons are Hr 12 to Hr 35. Small items such as erasers, pencil-sharpeners and drawing scales cost Hr 2 to Hr 3 per item. Pencil-boxes for these goods will cost you Hr 16 to Hr 40.

Introducing Tanuki – a pleasant encounter

Approximate of a Russian Japanese chain, Tanuki, is named after a Japanese raccoon dog and a popular folklore character, whose figurine can be often seen in the restaurants in Japan. In Kyiv, the creature found itself a warm spot right next to German consulate. The last time I was there applying for visa, the building where Tanuki is now located, was still a supermarket.

Walking up the stairs towards the entrance, I and my friend were welcomed and cheered by a doorman in colorful Japanese attire, and once inside a soft sound of gong announced our arrival. The restaurant was really spacious - 200 seats in all, yet I was absolutely right to book a table. Even though I called an hour before our arrival, they had only a few free tables left in VIP rooms, and that's where hostess showed us. As we walked through the main hall. I observed that while the restaurant was really big, it was smartly divided into many separate areas, so that every visitor could find a snug corner for themselves. There are tables of light wood with metal trays for food standing on them, tube-shaped paper lamps, partitions of really thick bamboo and a few columns in shape of trees, spreading their branches over the ceiling. Naturally, Tanuki statuettes are seen here and there. The entrance to our small VIP hall was partly concealed by a transparent curtain and its walls were painted with common Japanese pictures – birds, panda bears, sakura trees and hieroglyphs.

Once we set down, we were immediately attended to by a smiling and well-mannered waitress, whose pleasant attitude and unobtrusive service didn't alter throughout the evening. Right after she placed the menus of the table, we were treated to restaurant's compliment – a free cup of green tea for every visitor, poured out of a teapot with a very long spout. But my acquaintance with Tanuki didn't fully start until I opened the menu.

An extensive assortment of Japanese food for mid-range prices started with a list of sushi (Hr 8 for salmon), which included 10 kinds of spicy sushi in crunchy soy coating, 15 soups (Hr 19 for a Miso) of various kinds with meat



and seafood, about 27 rolls, including "rock n' roll" with salmon, eel, cucumber, black sesame and avocado (Hr 35), "Geisha Maki" with scallop, tobiko and mayonnaise (Hr 29) and classics like "California," made with actual crab meat and not with surimi, the way it's done at some of the cheap sushi places. Apart from traditional cold maki sushi, there were warm fried rolls as well. Cold appetizers included crab salad in omelet (Hr 39) and kimchee - spicy cabbage (Hr 15), and salads like soy sprouts in spicy sauce (Hr 13), tofu with prunes (Hr 19), and lettuce with scallops and marakuja sauce (Hr 35). Besides, there were 12 dishes of rice and Japanese noodles to choose from, and hot dishes such as eggplants fried with vegetables and shitake (Hr 28), chicken in teriyaki sauce (Hr 23), bits of pork with ginger and onions (Hr 39), and smoked eel on rice (Hr 86).

It's easy to guess, that the choice was hard to make, but in the end we settled on two original soups, a roll for each and spring rolls to share. Our waitress inquired if we wanted our wet towels hot or cold, and also if we preferred our soups or sushi first. Aware of the Japanese tradition of having sushi as an entree, we still chose to start our meal with soups – we're Ukrainians after all. For drinks we considered house beer Tanuki (Hr 20 for 0,5 liter) – light and unfiltered, plum wine, but once my friend mentioned sake, the waitress insisted that we simply must try it.

warm sake (clearly, a wonderful drink especially for colder weather), and in a while our soups arrived in metal bowls covered with wooden lids, which the waitress lifted before withdrawing. My friend was having some amazing coconut milk-based concoction with shrimp and vegetables (Hr 45). It gave a most unusual palate sensation - it was mild with coconut-and-shrimp flavor and pungent at the same time. My friend loved it, though she suggested one extra shrimp (there were just two) would add to her pleasure. As the waitress later remarked, my order – a shark fins soup (Hr 49) – was the most original soup offered at Tanuki. It was steaming hot with liquid jelly consistency, unusual flavor and thin strips of crab meat and egg floating inside. I was perfectly satisfied with it (despite having burned my tongue in the very beginning), but if asked. I couldn't exactly define what the shark fin tastes like - I didn't detect any distinct flavor, and it appeared like a nice rich seafood bouillon to me.

For rolls, I had "Unagi Uramaki" (Hr 51) with eel, avocado, salmon, cucumber and soft cheese – a perfect combination for me, and my friend checked out "Dragon Maki" (Hr 47) with eel, smoked salmon, spicy sauce, covered in dried tuna skin, which was likewise fine. All the ingredients were extremely fresh, well-blended together and masterly rolled – there is not much more

> We finished our sake, and thought that a Japanese dessert would make a great finishing touch to our meal. The sweets selection was likewise considerable, but most of all we were attracted by a sweet "Manila Roll" (Hr 22) and a Philadelphia cheese ice cream (Hr 24). With that we ordered more tea – lemon for me, and jasmine for my friend (Hr 18 for a small teapot).

> "Manila Roll" with kiwi, berries and creamy cottage cheese rolled into some soft white pastry, and lying in a pool of raspberry sauce was extremely delicious. As for Philadelphia ice cream, we unanimously pronounced it a real bliss – it tasted just like a cheesecake. As we finished our tea, perfectly satisfied with everything at Tanuki, we decided there was no better place to hold our next Friday night girls' gathering.

Choreographer Radu Poklitaru and his passion for dance

ell-known by ballet enthusiasts, Radu Poklitaru, the Moldovan-born choreographer, preserves a special place in his heart for each city he visits. And Kyiv, where his modern dance performance studio is headquartered, obviously is no exception.

He is quite the international type, at least on post-Soviet turf, having been born in Kishinev, having studied in Perm, Russia, but holding Belarusian citizenship. Yet Kyiv has been his home base for the past two years.

We met Poklitaru in Podil district, at the office of the Kyiv Modern Ballet, where he concocts his artistic modern dancing experiments.

Now that summer vacation is over, Radu and his ballet are soon to get really busy, since the troupe will kick the new season off with a tour to Spain.

One of their most impressive shows is to take place in Bilbao. "Carmen TV" ballet will be accompanied by a live orchestra and an opera vocalist, which is far from the typical style thus far for the Kyiv Modern Ballet.

As I learned from Radu, he has never studied the technique and styles of modern ballet. On the contrary, he was brought up in classic ballet traditions.

'When I was four years old, my parents, both academic ballet dancers, said that I love ballet; I believed them and still believe," Radu said.

"My credo in life is that a person should do what is easier for him to do, but should do it with all his efforts. For me it's easy to stage performances. I enjoy it and try to do my best," Radu stated.

After graduating from the Perm State Choreography College, Radu "performed waltzes in Swan Lakes," yet one day he understood that modern technique impresses him as a spectator far more then a classic one.

After receiving a diploma in choreography, he staged only one classic ballet, and has since dedicated himself to modern performances.

"I'm totally uneducated in the styles of modern dancing and try to cultivate this feature," he remarked.

"If a person is talented, he can create his own language without using any existing techniques and styles," he concluded.

One way or the other, the dancing technique introduced by Poklitaru is something peculiar.

Although there are good dancers that can be educated in modern technique, it's a difficult and long process. Moreover, there aren't any recognized modern dance lessons in the programs of choreography colleges in post-Soviet countries.

"Dancers are crippled in a way. They study classic dance, duos, character and national dance ... everything but modern dance. At the same time, modern dance accounts for 50 percent of all performances nowadays," Radu argued.

According to Radu, it's rather difficult for those performing in 'Giselle' and 'Swan Lake' all year round to switch abruptly and without training to an absolutely different technique once every two or three months.

Recently Radu received an offer to participate in the Ukrainian dancing TV show to air this fall on Inter channel, 'Tantsuyut Vse!' ('Everybody

Dance!'), yet he declined due to his busy schedule.

"I was offered a spot on the jury, But, we are going to Spain and I think they will find someone cheaper to be there all the time instead of me flying back and force," Radu noted ironically.

The first work staged by Radu in Ukraine was an opera-ballet called 'Le Forze del Destino' ('The Forces of Destiny'). After the premiere, Volodymyr Filipov, whose Art Fund donated money for the performance, proposed Radu to establish a ballet troupe of his own.

"I understood that such offers are made only once in lifetime and agreed at once. That's how the Kyiv Modern Ballet was founded," he explained.

Radu keeps calling Filipov some kind of "A Silver Age Patron," since theatre performances are mostly unprofitable, except for Broadway shows, of course, where one performance runs every day for seven years till it pays off the expenses.

As Radu argued, the money that the Modern Ballet gathers from tickets can only pay the rent of the venue, notwithstanding that his ballet troupe is the most expensive one in Kyiv and always gathers full house.

The next step of the Kyiv Modern Ballet is going to be "Palata n6" ("Ward n6"), based on the story by Anton Chekhov. The performance was already staged by Poklitaru in Russia, yet he stresses that the show in Kyiv will be unique, not a copy

"At the moment I'm perpetually listening to Tchaikovsky's "Pikovaya Dama" ("The Queen of Spades") and "Perezvony" ("Chimes") by Valeriy Gavrilov. It would be interesting to use



their music in the new performances," he shared

I suggested that Poklitaru should open a modern dance school of his own. "I would like to, but there is a prob-

lem finding a good renting place for regular work," he explained.

In essence, however, his troupe already functions as a school, having produced some of its stars from scratch.

Although the dancers initially accepted weren't required to have a diploma, now they've reached a professional level.

"The majority of them have not got any diploma in dancing, but they are one hundred times more energetically open to the audience than 'professionals' coming to the castings," Radu explained.



Independence Day

Ukraine flaunts military might amid perceived Russia threat



kraine held a military parade on Sunday during Independence Day celebrations, demonstrating might amid a perceived threat after Moscow's invasion of Georgia, a mutual pro-Western ally.

Some 3,500 soldiers, tanks, armored personal carriers and anti-aircraft systems rumbled down Khreshchatyk which cost Hr 70 million. A flyby of fighter jets and helicopters followed.

Addressing citizens, Ukrainian President Victor Yushchenko expressed solidarity with Georgia and said Kyiv's military should be beefed up. Ukraine seeks good relations with all neighbors, but he added: "We are well aware of the threats that are emerging more and more acutely in our region. We condemn acts of aggression."

This, the first military parade held by Kyiv since 2001, was planned months ago. But officials stressed its importance to show Ukraine's ability to defend itself, and the need to upgrade its aging Soviet military. In the 1990s, Ukraine relinquished its nuclear warheads to Russia, but retains a large conventional arsenal.

Simmering differences between Ukraine and Moscow have escalated into sharper rhetoric since the Georgia conflict. As with Georgia, Kyiv's relations with Moscow sunk after a prodemocracy revolution propelled to power a pro-western leadership that seeks speedy membership in the European Union and NATO.

Yushchenko said NATO membership would bring security guarantees. Still, most citizens fear it will anger Moscow and draw Ukraine into conflicts.

Nervous by Russia's use of naval vessels stationed at Ukraine's Crimean peninsula against Georgia, Kyiv fears Moscow may refuse to remove its fleet in 2017 when a lease agreement expires. Fears also loom that pro-Russian sentiment in Crimea could flare up separatism. Without mentioning Russia, Yushchenko said: "Nobody will ever instruct us on what road to choose. Nobody will ever cut off our borders, islands or peninsulas." 
